What is it?

A program for families with a child up to age 3 with a delay in development and/or qualifying diagnosis. We will evaluate your child's development and determine if your child qualifies for supports and services. Our primary services include: speech, occupational, physical, and developmental intervention and therapy.



How can it benefit me?

Research shows that the first 3 years of life are critical for development and learning. If your child is determined eligible, your family will be connected with a service coordinator to organize in-home or community based services. Together with your coordinator, you'll direct services and develop an Individualized Family Service Plan.



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Several areas of development factor into a child's eligibility, including:

Physical

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Communication

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Social/Emotional

Developing relationships, self-soothing, getting along with others, & expressing feelings

Adaptive

Self-help skills: eating, drinking & dressing

Cognitive

Thinking, learning, reasoning, playing, & attention
